# India

If choosing the right hotel can feel akin to climbing a summit, then travelers to India start at a higher base camp than most: Stay at any luxury hotel here and you're more or less guaranteed good food and attentive service. (Maybe too attentive? The Indian version of service is much more, let's say, involved than many Westerners are accustomed to.) But the most memorable hotels offer something else—their own interpretations of Indian history. Think of the coolly elegant Imperial New Delhi, its hallways hung with Raj-era photographs, or the grand, marble-floored Taj Mahal Palace in Mumbai, both of which pay homage to the country's colonial era; or of Jaipur's ecstatically colorful and patterned Suján Rajmahal Palace, a former royal guesthouse that finds its inspiration in the glory and excess of the Mughals. And it's not only the aesthetics that make Indian hotels singular, it's how creatively, and boldly, they incorporate the country's most iconic landscapes and sites. One has only to stay at the Oberoi Amarvilas, in Agra, where every room has a view of the Taj Mahal—accessible via a golf-cart ride provided by the hotel—or Amanbagh, outside Jaipur, drawn along the lines of a former prince's hunting grounds, where the air is fragrant with wood smoke from the nearby villages and loud with the chatter of monkeys, to know this. But what unites them all is a dedication to splendor: You're on vacation, they remind us—isn't this the time to be dazzled?

"It earned its place on the Grand Tour in the late nineteenth century, and achieves a near impossible visual trifecta with views of Mount Etna, the Ionian Sea, and the third-century b.c. Greek theater." *P.G.*

### **Grand Hotel a Villa**

**Feltrinelli**, Brescia, Lombardy  
"The decor is divine, the view of Lake Garda is so relaxing your shoulders will drop three inches, and the restaurant has some of the best food we've ever had at a hotel, much of it from its garden." *Y.E.*

### **Grand Hotel Tremezzo**,

Como, Lombardy

## The SAFARI INDEX

Our Special Correspondent Sophy Roberts has been on 20 safaris in 13 African countries. Here, her picks for the ultimate properties that reflect the pulse of Africa, where the wild things roam right outside your door.



**andBeyond Phinda Vlei Lodge**  
If South Africa is the sure-hit destination for the safari virgin, then this lodge—in a private game reserve easily overlooked for the more touristed Sabi Sands—is the one to satisfy the most finicky of travelers. Within this glass-and-thatch private world, you don't have to move from your king-size bed or tub to take in the cheetahs and rhinos crossing the *vleis* in front.

**Camp Nomade**  
Brightly painted steel trunks, camel bells, and scores of lanterns make this sometimes mobile tented camp in Chad completely of its place in north-central Africa. The wildlife highlight is Zakouma National Park's thriving elephant herd.

**Greystoke Mahale**  
One of the most beautifully built lodges in Africa, it was redesigned by the so-called Brunelleschi of the Bush, Kenya-based Ben Jackson. You come to track habituated chimps, but this Tanzanian lodge detoxes your soul.

**Mwiba Lodge**  
Extreme luxury done with class—you can feel the care of the American owners here. Rooms catch the Tanzanian dawn, the leopard coming in to drink, the weaver bird nests that quiver like baubles in the acacia trees.

**Segera Retreat**  
Kenya's Segera works for second-time visitors to Africa, or for a large hit of luxury at the end of a dusty tour. Hole up in the spa, beside the pool, and savor every bite of that seriously thoughtful organic food.

**Singita Sabora Tented Camp**  
Made up of 1920s-style tents on Tanzania's Sabora Plain, Sabora makes you feel like you're the mistress in *White Mischief*, surrounded by campaign furniture, Persian rugs, gramophones, a hundred candles, and zebras snorting under a starpricked sky.

**Sirikoi**  
This Kenyan lodge has the inimitable texture of longtime owners who care (hence the high repeat rate), with fireplaces adorned with family photos of the odd HRH. Lewa Wildlife Conservancy's healthy rhino herds graze like happy sheep all around. Food is a generous alfresco feast every day, from beef salads to Anglo-Indian curries.

**Babington House**

Owned by Soho House, this 18-acre Georgian estate in Somerset has an eighteenth-century Georgian church, a walled garden, and indoor and outdoor pools that alone are worth the trip.

**Barnsley House**

It's less grand than the regal manors typical of the Cotswolds, but noted Brit gardener Rosemary Verey used to live here, and her perfectly landscaped gardens remain. The spa is top-notch, too.

**Gravetye Manor**

This Sussex estate has charm in spades—oak-wood salons, four-poster beds, roaring fireplaces, and a thousand rambling acres of apple orchards, lilies, rose bushes, and swan ponds.

**Lime Wood**

Hampshire's New Forest is a camping favorite for London families. But those wanting to toast themselves post-hike with a stiff drink in a glass-atrium courtyard should stay at this manor house with interiors by designer David Collins. *Erin Florio*

# Amalfi Coast

By virtue, perhaps, of a connecting road so narrow and vertiginous—and a Southern Italian infrastructure so byzantine—the charms of the Amalfi Coast will likely remain unchanged for the foreseeable future. The big-three properties, each distinct in vibe and management style, embody through their unparalleled natural settings, food, decor, and, most importantly, their proprietors, the very essence of la dolce vita. In the center of Positano, Le Sirenuse balances centrality with a pristine design sensibility and honeymooners' pool aerie. The super-chic Il San Pietro di Positano, just outside town, has the kind of private beach and high-up outdoor cocktail and dining

terraces cantilevered over the Mediterranean that made you want to come all this way in the first place. While some rooms in the family-friendly Hotel Santa Caterina, with its lemon orchards and sea views, are more up-to-date than others (we love the newly renovated Room 28 and its wraparound terraces), you can't argue with the pool etched into the mountain overlooking the sea... and the food, the kind you wish you could eat every day for the rest of your life. **PILAR GUZMÁN**



# Marrakech

Even more so than the Jardin Majorelle, with its iconic electric-blue villa and canary-yellow planters, or the Carnival-esque Jemaa el Fna Square, hotels here have the power to transport. Sitting in the grand marble lobby of Es Saadi, a hint of orange blossoms and cigarettes in the air, you can almost convince yourself that it's 1968 and Keith and Mick are about to walk by. At the Royal Mansour, you'll play out a modern *One Thousand and One Nights* fantasy in a private riad with your own rooftop terrace and hammam. La Mamounia, on the other hand, is one big fabulous spectacle. There's nothing subtle about it, from the doormen dressed in billowing white pants, fez, and red velvet cape to the exquisite peacock feather-hued zellige tiles over nearly

every surface (for Moroccan minimalism—white tile, neutral textiles, and cream Beni Ourain rugs—stay at the new Mandarin Oriental just outside the city). If your idea of Marrakech is waking to the call to prayer echoing from the Koutoubia Mosque and sipping mint tea in the square, then an Old City riad turned hotel is the way to go, and Vanessa Branson's El Fenn is the best in the category. Not sure which version of Marrakech you want? Choose one and just go with it. The city gets deep under your skin. You'll be back.

WHERE to GET HEALTHY-ISH

The medi-spa trend is exploding, and more hotels are killing it with state-of-the-art wellness programs. But this year we're all about the places that let you live it up a bit outside the treatment room and the gym.

**Bio-Hotel Stanglwirt**, Austria  
 Like something out of *The Sound of Music*, this Tyrolean family-run lodge with ten saunas and baths fed by Alpine springs (plus dairy cows!) is the rare spa that's also kid-friendly. *Jennifer Miller*

**COMO Shambhala Estate**, Ubud, Bali  
 Yes, it has three pools, a private waterfall, and nine types of massage, but the real treat of staying here is the food. Many places make good, even excellent, low-cal all-organic macrobiotic fare, but no one does it with as much style and subtlety of flavor as this retreat. *H.Y.*

**Kamalaya**, Koh Samui, Thailand  
 The monastic-chic vibe of cabins with plunge pools built into a jungle-y hillside gives this Thai stalwart the feel of a Buddhist sanctuary, not a boot camp. *D.P.*

**Les Sources de Caudalie**, Bordeaux, France  
 Soak in the hot spring pool, get a vinotherapy massage, then roll over for a wine tasting from the spa's vineyard, Château Haut Smith Lafitte. *Y.E.* ♦
